

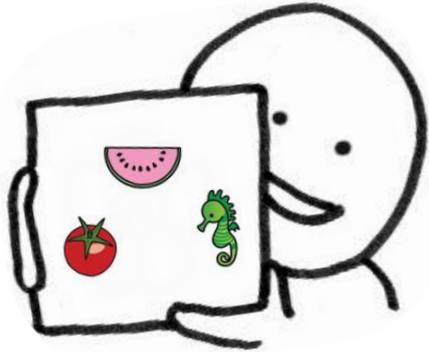

What is Photographic Memory?

Photographic memory—also known as eidetic memory—is the ability to vividly recall images, sounds, or objects after only a brief exposure. In early childhood, this skill is naturally present due to the brain's relaxed theta and alpha wave state. Young children absorb visual information quickly and deeply, especially when they are relaxed, emotionally safe, and engaged in play.

Memory games are more than just fun—they lay the foundation for effortless recall, focus, and creativity later in life. When presented in a gentle, loving way, they also strengthen emotional connection and build confidence.

At TweedleWink, we begin developing memory gently—first through **matching**, then through **playful recall**, and finally through active **visual imagination**.

How to Prepare Your Matching Cards



1. **Print** your card sets on thick cardstock (lamine if possible for durability).
2. **Cut** each card out cleanly. (Round corners with a fingernail clipper.)
3. **Laminate** cards you'd like to use over and over again.

How to Play Matching Games

1. **Mix** and shuffle them lightly.
2. Start with just **2–3 pairs** for younger children (older children can work with more).
3. Lay all cards **face-up** on a soft surface.
4. **Say:** “Can you find the two that match?”
5. When your child finds a pair, **celebrate!**



How to use Matching cards for Memory play: Alternatively, when your child is ready for advanced memory play, you can simply turn the cards face-down for a classic memory game:

1. Take turns turning over two cards.
2. If the images match, keep the pair. If not, turn them back over and try again.

Keep Going!

Matching Supports Learning

Matching strengthens visual discrimination, pattern recognition, and concentration. It also encourages the left and right hemispheres of the brain to work together!

How to Add More Matching Play to Your Day

- Match **real objects** around the house: “Can you find two socks that match?”
- Match **pictures in books**: “Where is the flower like the one on the last page?”
- Create themed collections using your child’s toys or drawings.

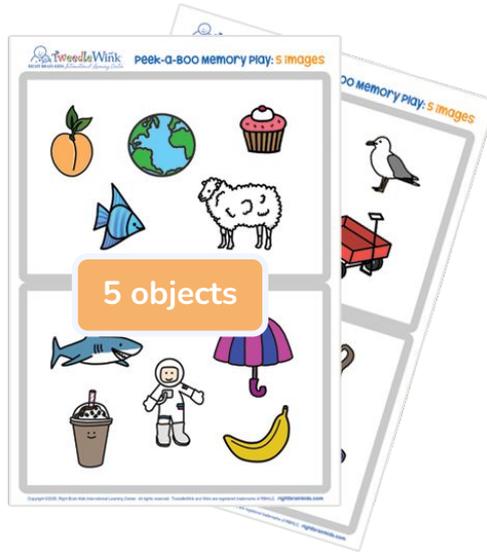

How to Prepare Your Peek-a-boo Cards



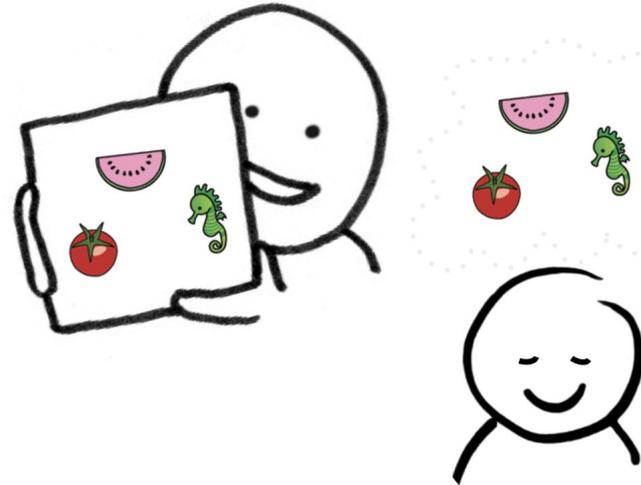
1. Print the cards on cardstock.
2. Cut and sort into groups: 3 objects = beginner, 5 objects = medium, 8 objects = advanced
3. Laminate or mount on stiff paper if desired.

How to Play “Peek-a-boo”

1. Sit in a quiet space.
2. Say: “**Look carefully—I’m going to show you a picture for just a moment.**”
3. Show the first card for about 3-5 seconds.
4. Cover the card or turn it over.
5. Ask: “**What did you see?**”
6. Wait patiently for a response.

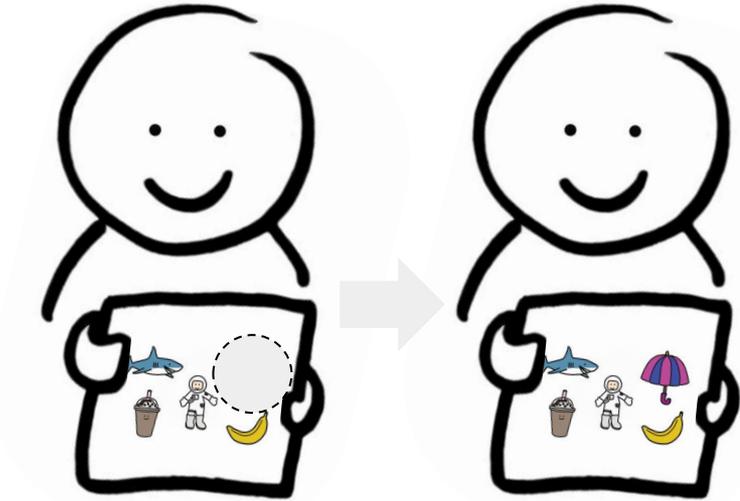
(If you sense your child is nervous or unsure, feel free to show the card again.)

Remember: the more gentle and stress-free the experience, the more easily your child will be able to access flashed images in the subconscious mind.



How to Play “What’s Missing?”

1. Sit in a quiet space.
2. Say: **“Look carefully—Do you see all the objects on this card?”**
3. Show the card for about 3-5 seconds.
4. Now, ask your child to close their eyes while you cover one of images.
5. Ask: **“What’s missing?”**
6. Wait patiently for a response.
7. Uncover the image to let your child see if they remembered the object!
(Let your child see if they got it right without any sense of judgment.)



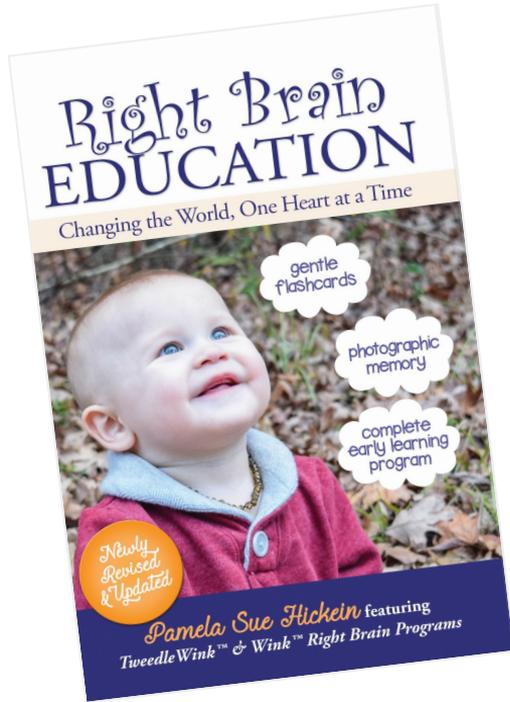
Daily Photographic Memory Play

Photographic memory begins with peaceful moments of observation and joyful recall. By incorporating just a few minutes of matching and memory play each day, you are building lasting brain pathways for focus, creativity, and lifelong learning.

How to Keep the Fun Going

- Create your own Peek-a-Boo memory cards with magazine cutouts or drawings.
- Use objects from around the room: arrange 3 toys, then hide one.
- Let your child take a turn “being the teacher”—they love quizzing *you!*

The most important key to success with right-brain memory play is to do it with love. With each game, you’re planting seeds that will grow into wonder.
